Entrance Management Plan (EMP) feedback extension

The Entrance Management Plan (EMP) feedback has been extended to 26th May. An information spread and petition have been included in the Heads News. **Anzac Day**

Clr Selena Clancy said Anzac Day at the Heads had an impressive turnout and appreciated being a part of this important remembrance occasion.

Wharf Road Boat ramp upgrade

The progress to deliver this project has been very disappointing. The need has been clearly demonstrated and yet the funding has been withheld and reallocated in the past. The tourism and fishing community have an expectation that this modest upgrade project should be delivered by Council and State Government without further delay. The Coastal Management Program has funding earmarked for a Living Shoreline which was not requested, and which will not deliver for the community. It was agreed unanimously that these funds be used to upgrade the Wharf Road Boat ramp.

Native Botanic Garden - Tom Korevaar

The Botanic Gardens Day event on Sunday 25 May 2025, 10 am to 2 pm, is expected to attract many visitors including people from the broader Shoalhaven / Illawarra area.

Learning how to use our Hortis 360 Platform from your smart phone will be central to promoting the theme "Guardians of the Green. Protecting Our Future".

Additionally, "walk-throughs" of the garden, community information stalls, barbecue & light refreshment offerings and live music, will ensure an enjoyable outing for all ages.

Rob Stewart (the gardens president and curator) will be speaking at a Pacific Region Hortis 360 webinar meeting. The invitation for him to address this

international seminar is a nice recognition of the status of Shoalhaven Heads Native Botanic Garden and the advanced work being done in our project.

Shoalhaven Heads Estuary Task Force - Phil Guy

Phil gave the history of the Wharf Road boat ramp upgrade and noted the way the project has been expanded from only an upgrade to the ramp to including adjacent parking and amenities. This is contrary to the community request and has seen the cost of the project increase. Council has no funds to meet the grant condition of 50% Council contribution, nor 25% reduced contribution and is requesting full grant assistance - which is highly unlikely. This much needed upgrade is a priority for the village and the CMO should be amended to include the upgrade. Phil is seeking the assistance of MP Gareth Ward via a Zoom meeting to hear the issues and support the request. These funds come from Transport NSW and that agency has been missing in action at the table with CMP and other issues.

The SHET has worked jointly with Forum to provide thorough and valid feedback to Council on the Entrance Management Policy and is relying on our Councillors to deliver a better outcome.

Meals on Wheels - Kim McGuire

Kim reflected on the service which has been going since the early 80s and today has 30 clients who may choose their meals from a menu. 20th May will see a joint picnic in the park with the preschool. The roof of the building has sprung a leak, and Council is attempting to rectify the matter.

Lions Club - Gidg Zealand

The Social Hub has returned after school holidays and will have a speaker on Monday 12th to inform the attendees on home care packaged for elderly people and processes to ensure adequate support is being provided.

Lions will have run a Bunnings BBQ on 1st June and Gidg thanked the friends of Lions who help at the BBQs.

FLOOD AT 1.574M SHOWS WHERE THE DAMAGE BEGINS



1.574m peak water level at a house in Hay Ave (red lines added for clarity)

At 7:30pm on Friday 23 May, the Shoalhaven River peaked at 1.574 metres AHD. That's well below the official 2.0 metre trigger set out in Shoalhaven City Council's draft Entrance Management Policy (EMP). Yet even at that level, residents in parts of Shoalhaven Heads were dealing with water in garages, low-lying yards, and driveways (including in Jerry Bailey Road).

It wasn't a major flood — but it was enough to show where the problems begin.

What Happens as the River Rises?

To help clarify the issue, here's a simple guide to how impacts build — and what the current policy allows:

Height (AHD)	What This Level Relates To
1.5m	Water begins entering non-habitable areas like garages and yards in low areas.
1.8m	Proposed notch height — low enough to help the river drain, but high enough to avoid reverse ocean flow.
2.0m	Current EMP setting: Council can cut the berm only once the river level at Shoalhaven Heads reaches this point, typically during a Flood Warning.
2.25-2.6m	Typical sand berm height. If the berm is too high, cutting it becomes slower and more difficult.

By the time the river hits 2.0 metres, another halfmetre of water may already be flowing through garages and yards — leaving behind mud, debris and damage. That's additional cleanup and disruption for residents.

Council's policy is based on modelling and professional assessments. But the community isn't disputing the science - it's asking for something the EMP doesn't yet account for: lived experience.

A Trial Approach

The petition, signed by more than 550 residents, doesn't call for the river to be opened automatically at 1.5 metres. What it asks is that 1.5 metres be treated as a signal to act — a level where Council can start

BOTANIC GARDENS

Writing this in early May, it seems hard to believe that winter is (almost) here! Beautiful warm days here in our piece of paradise have encouraged many to be out in nature or the garden enjoying every moment of it. Now is a good time to prune natives that have finished flowering, especially to maintain a compact shape. Many natives can become "leggy", where the branches and leaves are sparse. Pruning also encourages profuse flowering, and sometimes a second flowering. Some plants such as Lilly Pillys (Syzygium/Acmena), Correa alba, Coastal Rosemary (Westringia fru-

preparing if flooding looks likely. It also asks that the notch — the section of the river mouth that's kept low to let water escape - be maintained at 1.8 metres instead of 2.0. That way, if the river keeps rising, Council can cut a berm breach point down to the same level and create a pilot channel, allowing the river to start draining sooner.

Water was already reaching garages and yards at around 1.5 metres. Based on what was observed, this supports the community's call for 1.5 metres to become an action level where preparation can begin.

CIr Clancy to Present Petition

Shoalhaven Councillor Selena Clancy has confirmed she will present the petition at the next Council meeting.

"This is an issue the community has raised clearly and consistently," Clr Clancy said. "I'll be pushing for it to be properly considered."

The EMP is expected to return to Council's agenda in mid-June. **Heads News**

NEW DUNE CARE GROUP - VOLUNTEERS NEEDED



A newly formed Dune Care Group is getting ready to support ongoing efforts to protect the beach at Shoalhaven Heads.

Coordinated by Claude Domio, the group has already signed up around ten volunteers and is now looking for more. Councillor Selena Clancy has joined as a community member and says the aim is to work with Council, not against it.

"The group's off to a good start," she said. "We just want to make sure the work is looked after properly."

Sand was recently cleared and new plants added by Council contractors, but fences to protect the site are still missing — a concern shared by many locals. Claude says there's a 10-week maintenance period in place, after which the volunteer group hopes to take on a hands-on role.

A background in land and water conservation means Claude brings some practical know-how, but he's quick via the Community Forum. to point out this is a team effort.



"We'll set a regular time to meet — maybe once a fortnight. It's not heavy work, just helping the dunes recover."

BRASS SUCCESS FOR DUNSTAN FAMILY IN MELBOURNE

Shoalhaven Heads sisters Isla and Sophie Dunstan recently returned from the Australian National Brass Band Championships in Melbourne with their dad John, after competing as part of the City of Wollongong Junior Brass Band.

Held at Xavier College in Kew, the band competed in two sections - Junior B Grade and Open D Grade. "In the Junior B Grade, we came second," said Sophie. "So we're the second-best junior band in Australia!" In the Open D Grade, which is open to all ages, they placed fourth.

The family turned the trip into

a holiday, stopping at Bermagui and Eden on the way down, and Echuca on the way home. "It was way better than last year when it was all the way in South Australia," Isla said. "This time we made a whole trip out of it."

The event also included a street march. Isla described a spiral formation the band performed mid-march: "We lined up, and then one group would loop behind the other to make a massive spiral. It looked really cool." Their drum major Evan, just 16, won Best Drum Major in the D Grade section — a standout achievement for his first time in the role, after two months of early morning lessons with a senior conductor.

Both girls have been part of the junior band since age nine, with Isla on E-flat tuba and Sophie on second cornet. "We literally joined on our birthday," Isla laughed. "I remember walking out of rehearsal with a birthday sticker from our conductor."

Isla said playing tuba comes with pressure. "If the



tubas play fast, the whole band plays fast. It's a big responsibility."

Isla now has a 25% school music scholarship, while Sophie received a general excellence scholarship after a tough academic test and portfolio assessment. "They wouldn't give two of the same scholarship to sisters in the same year," Sophie explained, "so I went for a different one."

The band rehearses in Wollongong each Friday. "Nowra has a town band," said John, "but there's no junior program like Wollongong has, so we make the trip." John, who has played trumpet and cornet in bands, orchestras and even the Opera House, said it's special to see his daughters follow the same path.

Their next competition is in August at the NSW state titles in Sydney, with the 2026 nationals to be held in Brisbane.

IS OUR VOTING SYSTEM FAIR? WHY THE ANSWER ISN'T SO SIMPLE

about how the system works - and whether the results are truly fair. The 2025 federal election was no exception. With a significant swing against the Coalition and a notable number of independents and minor party candidates winning seats, some commentators suggested the system was stacked or distorted.

But before jumping to conclusions, it's worth looking at how our voting system actually works — and how much of what happens comes down to the choices of voters themselves.

Preferential voting is designed to reflect what voters want

Australia's House of Representatives uses preferential voting in single-member electorates. That means voters number candidates in order of preference, rather than just ticking a single box.

This gives voters more control:

- You can support a minor party or independent first, without "wasting" your vote.
- If your first-choice candidate is eliminated, your vote moves to your next choice.
- Your vote still counts even if your top pick doesn't win.

This is very different from systems like first-past-thepost (used in the UK and US), where whoever gets the most votes wins, even if most voters preferred someone else overall.

So who decides where preferences go? You do.

A common misunderstanding — often repeated in

After every election, questions inevitably surface media - is that "a candidate's preferences flowed to representation system, like Tasmania's Hare-Clark another candidate." But candidates don't control preferences.

Here's what actually happens:

- Parties can suggest preferences using how-to-vote cards.
- But it's voters who number their ballots, and only those markings determine where preferences go.
- While some voters may follow party suggestions, many choose their own order based on personal values or strategic thinking.

So when someone says "the Greens' preferences flowed to Labor," what actually happened is that many Greens voters decided to rank Labor ahead of others not that the Greens handed over their votes.

But what about fairness?

Some critics point out that the winning party doesn't always match the overall national vote share. That's not because of preferential voting — it's because of how we divide the country into single-member electorates.

This system tends to favour major parties with concentrated support in key areas and under-represents minor parties even when they have significant national support.

- For example, a party might win:
- 10% of the vote nationally, but
- 0 seats, because they weren't a front-runner in any single electorate.

That's why some people advocate for a proportional

model.

What is Hare-Clark?

- Hare-Clark uses:
- Multi-member electorates (e.g. 5 MPs per district),
- Preferential voting, and
- A method of allocating seats in proportion to votes received.

It allows for more diverse representation, better chances for independents and minor parties, and far fewer "wasted" votes - all while giving voters full control of their preferences.

Would it work federally? That's a longer conversation. But it's one way to address the disproportionality that can emerge in single-member systems, even under preferential voting.

Final thought

Australia's electoral system isn't perfect. But it's one of the fairest in the world — because it allows voters to express their preferences clearly and have their voices count.

If the outcomes seem lopsided or uneven, it's not because the system is rigged — it's because voters are using the system strategically, deliberately, and in increasing numbers, creatively.

Rather than scrap it, we should keep understanding it — and make sure it continues to reflect the will of the people, however complex that will may be.

SLASH ELECTRICITY BILLS WITH SOLAR & BATTERY — BIG REBATES NOW AVAILABLE

Home batteries are more affordable than ever — and from 1 July 2025, a new federal rebate will cut battery costs by around \$370 per kilowatt-hour (kWh) of storage. That means a typical 10kWh battery could receive over \$3,700 off the upfront cost.

Here's how to plan a system that suits your home and how much you might save.

1. What Kind of Home Energy Use Matches Yours?

Use this table to compare three common household patterns and how solar (with or without battery) can help reduce your bills.

	Home During the Day (e.g. retirees, remote workers)	Out All Day, Home at Night (e.g. working families)	High Energy Household (e.g. EVs, pools, large families)
System	5kW solar only	6.6kW solar + 10kWh battery	10kW solar + 13kWh battery
Power Use Pattern	Can run appliances during the day	Most energy use is after sunset	High use day and night
Self-Use of Solar	~10kWh/day	~15kWh/day via battery	~20kWh/day
Daily Savings Estimate	~\$3/day (using solar instead of grid)	~\$4.50/day (store and use own power)	~\$6/day (self- powered most of the time)
Annual Savings Estimate	~\$1,000+	~\$1,500-1,700	~\$2,000+
Battery Recommended?	Not essential	Yes	Yes

Tip: Even without a battery, you can increase savings by running appliances during the day — many machines can be set to run automatically with a timer.

2. How Much Solar Do You Need?

A rough guide:

- A 5kW solar system generates about 20kWh/day on average
- \rightarrow 30kWh/day in summer
- \rightarrow 10kWh/day or less in winter

Solar energy is generated mostly between 9am and

4pm. You can use this energy directly, store it in a battery, or feed it back into the grid (which still earns you a feed-in tariff and supports larger-scale storage like pumped hydro or grid batteries).

- 🔶 Oversizing isn't wasteful: A larger system performs better on cloudy days and in winter. It ensures your battery can be topped up consistently, even in less-than-ideal conditions.

3. What to Ask Your Installer

- Can the solar system charge the battery in winter?
- How much solar will I use versus send to the grid?
- Does the battery provide blackout backup? What can it power?
- Can I expand the system later (e.g. for an EV charger)?
- Will the system qualify for the federal battery rebate?

Installers should be Clean Energy Council-accredited and willing to explain how the system will work in both summer and winter — and how long it might take to recover your upfront investment through energy savings.

4. About the Federal Battery Rebate

The Cheaper Home Batteries Program begins 1 July 2025. Key details:

- Around \$370 per usable kWh of battery storage
- A 10kWh battery could receive over \$3,700 in discounts
- Available for eligible households with new or existing solar

Structure fire at Aspinall Street

One Sunday afternoon, we were called to a structure fire at Aspinall Street in the village. A passer-by had noticed a smoke plume rising from the shops and thinking it unusual, reported a fire. Imagine the owner of the Pizza shop's surprise when two Fire Trucks and nine firefighters roll up, lights flashing and sirens blaring, when all he was doing was "cleaning" the ovens.

Whilst there is a humorous side to this "incident", the RFS would prefer to be called on a smoke sighting if you have any concerns. Imagine a genuine incident going unreported.

Semi-trailer fire

A semi-trailer fire was reported on a Friday. Around mid-morning, both our Pumper and Cat1 Tankers responded to the Princess Hwy at Gerringong where we found the Prime mover had decoupled from its trailer. The contents, which was material for recycling was smouldering.

We were joined on scene by RFS Gerringong and FRNSW Kiama, where crews worked to cool the smoking material. An Excavator was brought in to empty the trailer, allowing firefighters access to extinguish the fire. Once out, the load was transferred to another truck & Trailer.

It took a massive amount of water, an estimated 50,000 litres, to complete the task. When you consider most large RFS Fire Trucks carry 3000 to 3500 litres, that's a lot of "To and Fro" trips between the nearest Fire Hydrant and the fire, by supporting vehicles.

Recycling is an important feature of modern life. Please consider the suitability of what you place in the Yellow Bin. This is the second such incident in recent memory.

WILDLIFE MATTERS - MOTHER'S DAY-HUMPBACK STYLE

It is that time of year when mother whales begin their long migration north to give birth to the new members of the species.

After 10-11 months of being pregnant, females will give birth in the warmer waters off the East Coast of Australia.

These mammals can live for a century and will produce a single calf every 2/3 years of their entire life.

She will give birth in sheltered waters, feed and fatten her calf to give them energy for the long journey south.

Females are fertile just a month after giving birth and male escorts are aplenty on the route home, not being gentlemanly, but seeking to breed again immediately.

Yet, the females are focused entirely on motherhood in caring and nurturing their baby for the year ahead. She will invest 2 years into her calf and will not eat for most of her migration home.

Along the way, she will rest in quiet and safe spots with little stimulus so the calf can be calm and rested from the bluster of the males. She has visited these spots for many years and knows how to protect her family.



The whale sisterhood is also around for protection and females will travel together with their calves playing and learning about being whales before the pod joins together in the feeding frenzy of the Southern Ocean.

Patagonia - Part Two by Somprom Svinos

Our journey continued at Parque Nacional Torres del Paine, Chile's 'Towers of Blue.' Staying at Hotel Las Torres, we enjoyed an all-inclusive package covering meals, beverages, and activities.

San Carlos de Bariloche
